Our Director and Vice President, Faye Mitchell, is resigning after seven years of dedicated service to live abroad with her children. We are delighted to report that we are currently sponsoring sixty-five community improvement projects. This spring we sponsored five new efforts, including:

- RECAP. This partnership was formed with the Kohala Hospital Charitable Foundation to assist in the fund development effort to relocate and expand the Emergency Room at Kohala Hospital.
- CERT. This volunteer group is trained by the Fire Department and Civil Defense
